There, Hannah picked up 2 relay gold, 3 individual silver and 4 individual bronze in the multi-disability categories. She currently holds the 13-years and 16-years record for deaf girls 50m breaststroke, her favourite event. Hanna will be invited to Sydney for a presentation at Olympic Park in December. Kadina High School wishes Hannah all the best in the future and believe she will be a name to remember in the sporting field.

Our textile students excelled at the recent North Coast Nationals at the Lismore show with students in years 10, 11 and 12 taking major placings. As Ms. Shepherd says, Kadina has a long history in textiles creativity. The exciting news was that Kadina High School was named the most successful secondary school exhibitor in the pavilion at the Lismore Show. This is the third time in recent years the school has achieved this recognition.

Awards for Distance Education Students

In a National French competition, French Certificate 2, held late last term, Vienna Barker of Year 10 was awarded a Distinction for Listening/ and a High Distinction for Reading.

Along with several other of our students, Vienna is studying French via the Southern Cross Distance Education Centre. Distance Education is provided at a relatively small cost to students who are unable to study subjects of their choice due to timetable clashes or because it isn't provided at the school.

Students from Yrs 9, 10, 11 and 12 have been studying languages and other subjects where instruction is delivered through the mail, email, online lessons using Moodle and weekly phone calls to their teachers. Special study days at the Southern Cross Centre are sometimes held where our students can meet students from other schools studying the same subjects. Studying via Distance Education does require a great deal of self discipline to keep up with the work, so the students need to be fully committed to their subject. Kadina's timetable allocates them periods of study time in the Library. They are encouraged however to seek help whenever problems arise, from Kadina's Distance Ed supervisor, Mrs McLeod in the Library, or from their Distance Ed teacher. But the teaching is thorough, as evidenced from the successes of past and present students at Kadina.



Marlee Webb has received an Outstanding Achieve-

ment Award in Senior Beginners Japanese and Sophie Wilson has achieved Excellent Application & Results Award in Senior Japanese Continuers. Kurt Spargo of Year 11/12 has also been achieving excellent results for his Senior Japanese Continuers course. They are all a credit to our school, showing not only ability, but also commitment and diligence in their studies.

BRADLEY Hughes has done it all this year on the hockey field.

At just 15 years old, he became a regular starting player for East Lismore this season.

And to cap that off he was involved in a dominant New South Wales team that won the Australian under-15 boys' championship in Melbourne over the weekend.

The midfielder helped set up goal after goal at the championships. Hughes' team scored a whopping 70 goals and conceded just 11 at the competition.

This included monster wins over Northern Territory (16-0), South Australia (13-1), ACT (10-1), Victoria (11-3), Tasmania (8-0) and Western Australia (8-3).

Hughes' team did receive a scare from Queensland in its final match though.

With both teams competing for first place, New South Wales won 4-3 after the Queenslanders led 3-0 at half-time.

But a flood of goals from New South Wales in the second half gave Hughes' team the gold medal.

"It's the best feeling ever," the Kadina High School student said. "Stepping up to play premier league locally definitely helps take the pressure off when you go back to taking on kids your age."

And Bradley's sister Jennah in Year 7 at Kadina won silver for New South Wales under-13s at the national championships in the Northern Territory at the weekend.

Talking to Young People about Alcohol and Drugs

It is best for education about alcohol and drugs to begin before young people are exposed to personal decisions about their use. Young people who have accurate information, coping and decision making skills and understand the issues, will be in a good position to make responsible decisions about alcohol and drugs.

Parents and carers can begin this education in the home and support school and other programs such as the RRISK Seminars. Parents also provide a powerful role model when it comes to drinking and attitudes to alcohol and other drugs.

Take time to talk. For example, sitting down with the young person in your care and mapping out a plan of action and what to say if they are offered drugs or alcohol can help equip them for the almost inevitable real event. Listen to what the young person in your family says about alcohol and drugs and follow up with a discussion. Take the opportunities when they come up during everyday activities, for example:

When you pour a glass of alcohol

When alcohol or other drugs are mentioned on TV or other media

When using or giving out medicines

When your young person has an assignment on alcohol, smoking, medicines or other drugs.

It is important to understand that in some situations young people may take risks. Sitting down afterwards and helping them identify where things started to go wrong enables them to consider what they could do differently the next time they are faced with a similar situation.


