Mya was among 59 students from 37 public schools who came first or equal first in a HSC subject. Overall, 128 students from 89 government and non-government schools received a First in Course award.

Students from 17 comprehensive high schools took line honours in subjects including Maths Standard 2, English Extension 2, Drama, Construction, Automotive and Dance.

The students were presented with awards at a ceremony in Parramatta on Wednesday 13th December.

Mya topped the Business Service Examination and was equal first with 13 others in Mathematics Standard 2.

Mya's rare double in twice making the prestigious list reflects the talent, hard work and skillset on display across regional New South Wales, State Member for Lismore Janelle Saffin said.

Mya recognised the support of her family, friends and community in the Northern Rivers still rebuilding after last year's devastating floods.

She attributes her success to her hardworking mother who inspired her, and gave a special shoutout to her maths teacher, Rikki Wiblen.

"He's the best. He always explained things so well and was super helpful," she said.

Kadina campus principal James Witchard said Mya's achievement reflected the value of public education, "particularly in a regional setting where we focus on creating opportunities through strong relationships between students and teachers".

Mya is headed to university next year to study Law and Arts.

This establishment has been designed with a future focus that Kadina will be able to breed animals onsite for Agriculture moving forward, with the genetic records being utilised in Agriculture and Biology to provide a tangible link to genetic studies and understanding of genetic expression.

For most of the students this year the show season presented new and different opportunities and all students have enjoyed themselves thoroughly. The two black Angus heifers that we have exhibited this year saw their greatest success at the Alstonville show. Our animals placed 1st and 3rd in the female 12 and under 16 months class. 



Kadina Creates - Inclusive HSC - Disability Provisions

What are NESA HSC disability provisions?

Disability provisions assist students to read examination questions and write their answers. Provisions include rest breaks and extra time. The use of any provision is not written on the student's results. Students may need provisions for:

- · a permanent condition, such as diabetes or reading difficulty
- a temporary condition, such as a broken arm, or
- an intermittent condition, such as back pain when sitting for long periods.

It is not embarrassing to apply for or use provisions. More than 7000 HSC students apply for provisions each year. Provisions help students to show the markers what they know and can do

In providing disability provisions for the HSC exams, NESA complies with the *Disability Discrimination Act* 1992 (Cth) (DDA) and the *Disability Standards for Education* 2005, issued under the DDA.

Provisions are determined on the basis of functional evidence:

The impact of a condition or disability on how a student functions in an exam situation is the key consideration when determining provisions. Functional evidence can include results of the student's performance on approved reading and spelling tests, work samples that include extended responses and teacher comments on adjustments that have been trialed at school.

Applying for HSC disability provisions:

At Kadina High Campus, the Learning and Support teachers are responsible for submitting disability provision applications to NESA. However, students and their families are welcome and encouraged to be involved throughout the application process. You can do this by:

- discussing the impact of the student's disability with the school throughout schooling, including possible adjustments and support required for the student to access the curriculum as well as exams
- keeping the school up to date with any changes in impact of the disability, medications etc.
- advising the school when the student's scheduled specialist appointments are taking place. In this way, the school can provide medical forms requiring completion at the appropriate time so that a special appointment just for this purpose is not required.

Deadline for applications is the end of Term 1, 2024:

When you are making specialist appointments during the next 6 months, it's important to let the Learning and Support teachers know. We will provide you with the 2024 NESA Medical Form, to be completed by the specialist. This way you will not have to pay for another specialist appointment just for this purpose.

The Great Western Excursion

One of the focuses of the Rivers Academy of STEM Excellence is "STEMming the Divide" between the opportunities our students have in comparison to students in metropolitan areas. Part of this is our annual excursion across the Great Dividing Range. This brings students from across the three campuses The Rivers Secondary College together for a week of making new friends and participating in a range of new experiences that wouldn't normally be available to them.

National Marine Science Centre





Our first stop was at the National Marine Science Centre in Coffs Harbour. Here the students conducted a Sandy Shores ecology field trip in which they investigated the relationship between the non-living and living features of the beach environment. They sampled areas on the water's edge and near the dunes to determine the types and numbers of living things in each location.

Wollomombi Falls

students had Next up, opportunity to stretch their legs while they had a guided tour of the Wollomombi Falls area. Berney from National Parks spoke to the students about the geological formation of the amazing network of gorges in the area, how they were used by Aboriginal Australians, and how valuable they are for native wildlife, in particular Rock Wallabies.







UNE - Armidale

On day two, we had a full day of activities with staff from UNE. Students donned lab coats and safety glasses so they could take on the role of a creative chemist.

In The Natural History Museum, students completed an "escape room" activity in which they needed to use a variety of cryptic clues to open a series of locked boxes.

Next, they went on a university tour to see what is on offer at UNE and some of the processes involved in enrolling and studying there. At the SMART Farm Innovation Centre, they learned about the role of technology in agriculture and completed pasture quality analysis.

To round out the day, they went on a guided bird watching tour of Imbota Nature Reserve.







White Rock Wind Farm

Wow! What a great experience! Not many people are lucky enough to get up close to these massive, awe-inspiring turbines, let alone walk inside the base of one. Students had a great time learning about the technical aspects of wind farms and electricity generation.







The Living Classroom - Bingara The Night Crawl



Joined by local zoologist, Alex, we went on an adventure in the dark to spot local critters. This diverse environment is home to a large range of lizards, frogs, bugs, snakes and more. We were then treated to some of Alex's bush poetry.

Science, Culture and Fun



For the remainder of the time at Bingara, students took on the role of "crackpots" to develop their very own weird and wonderful crackpot theory, which they then presented on stage at the Roxy theatre, where they also enjoyed pizza, popcorn, and a movie.

They had a session with local high school Science teacher, Scott Crispin, to perform some water analysis of a local waterway and view some of the organisms under a microscope. We also visited the Myall Creek Memorial Site, where we heard about the local massacre and the annual memorial activities that have been taking place at the site since the year 2000.












Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.
