Kadina High Students Bringing Indigenous Games to Local Primary Schools

Empowering the Next Generation Through Cultural and Physical Education

In a heartwarming new initiative, Kadina High Campus students are stepping up to coach traditional Indigenous games in local primary schools, fostering a deeper understanding of cultural heritage and promoting physical activity among younger students.

The program, which is being rolled out in several primary schools in the region, sees Kadina High students acting as mentors and coaches, teaching younger students the traditional games that have been passed down through generations of Indigenous communities. This collaboration offers a unique opportunity for both groups, as high school students gain valuable peer leadership experience while primary school students learn firsthand about Indigenous cultures in an engaging and fun way.

The traditional games, many of which are designed to build agility, coordination, and teamwork, are being shared in the school setting. By participating in these games, students are not only getting active but also gaining a deeper appreciation for the diverse cultural traditions of Australia.






North Coast Volleyball Championships








Year 6 into 7 Orientation Days

North Cost National Lismore Show Ag Team

Another show season has come to an end. Students from Kadina High Campus have dedicated the last 12 months of their time during recess and lunch to working with and preparing the school's Angus cattle for exhibition at the local shows. Over 3 weeks of shows the students have worked together to exhibit our cattle and have faced challenges and stiff competition the whole way.

Junior paraders competitions are always fierce, with the whole focus being placed on the students with judging taking place around the presentation of the students and how they handle and work with their animal. This year's competitions saw a resurgence in the number of competitors at all shows, there were over 200 entrants at Lismore alone. It is always difficult to step into the public eye and put yourself on display, all the students on the show team have done so on multiple occasions this season. The students have gained invaluable experience along with tips and tricks from the judges and stewards to continue to grow as junior paraders.

Our cattle performed well across the shows this year. There was formidable competition from local producers and the other schools in the region. The students have gained further and valuable insights into what it takes to produce and maintain quality animals year-round. Smaller shows like Casino and Alstonville will have their cattle exhibited in three sections; British, European and Bos Indicus, while Lismore will break these sections into individual breed classes. Kadina opened its show season with a tough outing at Casino. The competition in the British breeds was of a very high quality across all age groups and we came with a 3rd placing in the Female 12 and under 16-month age group.

Lismore show saw competition against other Black Angus producers, where we again came away with a 3rd in the Female 12 and under 16-month age group. Kadina placed 2nd and 3rd in the Female 24 and under 30-month age group at Lismore show.

Alstonville was the last show of the season, where competition again moved back into all British breeds together. Our heifer 'Tia' placed 1st in the 24 and under 30-months age group and was then further judged to be the British Senior Female Champion. This is a great achievement for the show team as Tia was reserve senior champion at Alstonville in 2023.

The students of the show team are to be congratulated on their effort and dedication throughout the year for all their hard work in preparing and exhibiting the cattle. A massive thankyou is also extended to Casino Show Society Inc, North Coast National, and Alstonville Agricultural Show for running these events and providing the opportunities for the students and young people of the region to be involved and develop the skills to become the future of the agriculture industry in Australia.


The Rivers Secondary College HSC Showcase

The NSW Department of Education is making an important change to help keep our students safe online, reduce the risk of cyber threats and make sure your student email accounts are used for their intended educational purposes only.

What's happening

Starting Day 1 Term 4, you won't be able to use your student email address to sign up for, or recover access to any social media, gaming, instant messaging or similar accounts.

What you need to do

If you have signed up for a social media, gaming, instant messaging or similar account using your student email address, please change to a personal email address on each platform by Sunday 13 October to make sure you don't lose access to the account. Here's how:

- 1. Log in to each account.
- 2. Go to the account settings and update your email address to a personal one. Add a mobile number too, if you haven't already.

Why this is happening

The department is making this change to ensure all student accounts are being used for their educational purposes, and to help protect you from risks online. Using your personal email address for these platforms instead of your student email address reduces the chances of someone gaining access to information in your school account.

Bushfire danger period information for parents and carers



Factsheet

This factsheet provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bushfire danger period.

The NSW Department of Education has engaged external experts to conduct assessments of all NSW government schools, to identify schools at greater risk of impact from bushfires.

To support the health, safety and wellbeing of students and staff, the department, in consultation with NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS), will direct the school to temporarily cease operations on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating has been declared for your school's NSW fire area. Alternative learning arrangements will be put in place for these days.

Schools may be directed by the department to become non-operational at any time based on advice from emergency services and the State Emergency Operations Centre.



What is a Fire Danger Rating?

Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a fire start. The ratings are determined by a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought.

When will I know if my child's school has been made non-operational?

At approximately 4:00pm each day the Fire Danger Rating is issued for the following day. This means that schools, including onsite preschools, will be notified after school hours that it will be non-operational the following day. Your school will notify you as soon as possible by the preferred method of communication.

Parents and carers are requested to:

- provide up-to-date home and after-hours contact details to your school
- stay up-to-date with news and local media through the bushfire danger period.

What education arrangements will be in place if the school is non-operational?

When non-operational, your school will advise of alternative learning arrangements, including any relocation or learning from home plans.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- · Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.
