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



Year 12 Biology

During the last two weeks of term 2, Year 12 Biology have had the opportunity to extend their understanding of bio-engineering and how the use of single celled organisms can be utilised to create transgenic or genetically modified organisms.

The class have practiced working under laboratory conditions to introduce targeted genes to induce change in bacterial cultures. Over the course of two weeks the students introduced a Green Fluorescent Protein and a Blue protein to the samples, along with demonstrating antibiotic resistance. These experiences have helped to link real world experiences with content from modules 6 and 7 of the HSC Biology course while showing the students that the basic principles of bio-engineering can provide some exciting results with some very basic equipment.

The fluorescent protein is naturally occurring in organisms that express bioluminescence. After introduction into the bacteria sample the protein is expressed but is only capable of being seen with the use of a UV light. This process can be utilised in epidemiology and understanding how genes are passed on and expressed.

The blue protein, when introduced, does not present in every colony that grows. It does produce a very vibrant dark blue colouration. This can also be utilised as away to study gene expression and can also be utilised to examine how pathogens are spread throughout the environment.
















TRSC Stage 6 'Havoc in the Hall'














Kadina Creates Term 2 Assemblies

Check-in Assessment

The Check-in assessment is an annual online assessment for students in Years 3 to 9 in NSW Public Schools. All students complete a Reading and Numeracy test. Year 6 students also complete a Writing task.

Each assessment contains around 50 questions and takes up to 60 minutes to complete.

At Kadina High Campus, assessments will take place at the beginning of Term 3, during Weeks 1 and 2. Catch-up sessions will be arranged for any student who is absent on the day their year group is scheduled.

Adjustments and Support

Students with additional learning needs may wish to access provisions such as:

- Extra time
- Small group or individual supervision
- Rest breaks

The Learning and Support Team will discuss provisions with individual students prior to the assessment start date.

Purpose and Benefits

The Check-in assessment helps schools:

- Identify student strengths and learning needs
- Detect possible misconceptions
- Plan differentiated teaching strategies
- Identify students needing further support
- Highlight class-wide focus areas
- Reflect on and improve teaching practices
- Guide resource and programming decisions
- Support professional learning for staff

The results from the Check-in assessment provide valuable insight to support each student's learning journey.





Dear parents, guardians and carers,

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. GAME CHANGER CHALLENGE


Background

The Game Changer Challenge is the Department of Education's award-winning design thinking competition.

Open to public schools across the state, the challenge centres on discovering solutions for a real-world, wicked problem by applying classroom learning. This year, students from the Rivers Secondary College have the opportunity to submit their solutions to the wicked problem: Ensure Sustainable Futures for All



Students are sharing their ideas with each other and giving feedback.



Process

Students selected from the three focus areas - People, Places, Planet. They delved into issues surrounding sustainability and identified a local problem they wanted to solve. From here, they developed survey questions and conducted research to help guide them to come to a solution.

Result

After two full days of stretching their brains, learning new skills in research, data analysis and Canva tools, all students had developed a design portfolio that was published as a website and submitted ready for stage 2 in Term 3.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- · Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.
